European Global Surgery Network Inaugural Conference Essen, Germany October 8th -12th 2024

The global burden of disease caused by surgical diseases is greater than that of malaria, TB and HIV combined. It was declared the "neglected stepchild" of global health.

Global Surgery is a multidisciplinary field aimed at enhancing surgical care as an integrated aspect of a well-organized and "fit for purpose" health care system.

The conference is organized by the European Global Surgery Network and will start with 3 days (8-10th of October) of pre-conference hands-on workshops in diverse global surgical subjects as trauma, acute abdomen, ENT problems, anesthesia, gynecology, neurosurgery, etc. This course is organized for medical doctors and specialists from either high-or middle- and low-income countries with interest in global surgical subjects. We will learn from international teachers and participants about their experience in working in LMIC circumstances.

From 10-12th of October a global surgery conference continues after the practical course at the same venue in Essen. The purpose of this conference is to review our progress as a Global Surgery community, make inferences from our prior endeavors and define lessons learned. Furthermore, we seek to examine how we may proceed collaboratively. Our congress seeds friendships from which much new will be budding.

Our conference includes panel-style plenary sessions with international speakers from all over the world, breakout discussions that go more in-depth into some of the pertinent subjects, and relevant research at all levels from clinical to socioeconomic or even relating to health policy. We have set up interactive sessions, providing room for networking and allowing participants to best showcase their work and initiatives. We will be providing a poster session for young researchers with the opportunity for a select group to present their work as a short presentation during a breakout-session.
